INCIDENT ON THE CRICKET PITCH

Sunday 18th May was the first village open cricket event this year for the Iwerne Minster Cricket Club.

Everything pointed to a fine day for cricket as we assembled for a 2pm start. The ground was prepared, boundary markers in place with a playing surface set out on a scale similar to the Surrey Cricket Club home ground, the Oval.

With a determined band of players watched by a good number of spectators, we decided to play a single wicket competition with one batsman facing a number of overs before passing the batting opportunity to the next player. Unfortunately, during the second over, the batter collapsed. Immediately several people rushed to his aid.

Members of the team and some spectators volunteered support with CPR, a 999 call was made, the emergency services relayed advice over the phone.

The defibrillator was collected from outside The Talbot and the arrival of a villager with many years' experience as a paramedic was invaluable both in helping with CPR and to administer the defibrillator.

In time the air ambulance arrived (their third call out that day) and this was joined by three more ambulances and two solo medical first responders. With all this help, the patient was stabilised and transferred to hospital in the air ambulance.

From a community perspective the response was fantastic. The whole situation has also been seen by some as a concern in terms of how we should all be able to respond to an emergency situation, doing so with confidence in terms of communication and crisis management. It may well be that the ability to test ourselves in situations such as these should become part of a programme to raise our awareness and resilience collectively.

A footnote here concerns the Dorset/Somerset Air Ambulance organisation who are marking this year as their 25th anniversary and are currently fundraising for a second helicopter - what could we do to help them with this?

With reference to the incident above, the Parish Council is undertaking an investigation into the whole event which will be published at a later date.

VILLAGE DEFIBRILLATORS

Following the use of one of the village defibrillators recently, it might be helpful to give a brief summary of their locations and use, particularly for new arrivals to the village.

The defibrillators were funded by villager donations approximately seven years ago and we have three in the village located as follows:

- on the wall at the back of The Talbot in Post Office Road
- in the porch of St Mary's Church
- on the wall at the far end of Leopard Dairy (the long building on the left as you start to go up the hill towards Home Farm)

The cabinets containing the defibrillators were originally installed with combination locks, as is usually the case with public access cabinets. The default was to phone 999 to obtain the combination. However, this caused problems and delay when the defibrillator was recently used. Learning from this experience, all the combination locks have now been disabled and the cabinets are permanently 'unlocked'.

The defibrillator consists of a unit connected to two pads. After unzipping the outer container press the ON button and the unit will give verbal instructions on what to do. There is a pack in the front of the container containing scissors etc. It is necessary to completely bare the chest and shoulders to affix the pads - clothing must be torn or cut as necessary. It is worth emphasising that a defibrillator, in itself, is no use if Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is not performed promptly after a cardiac arrest, and continued without pause until a defibrillator or paramedic etc arrives. This can't be stressed enough. CPR saves lives. It needs to be done efficiently and is very hard work. If you don't know how to perform CPR, do please consider taking a First Aid course!

A350 TRAFFIC CALMING

Firstly, I would like to thank all those who replied to the questionnaire. We had 89 responses from the village with some very sound insights and thoughts on how things could be alleviated.

On the question of whether you would support action to lobby for a 20mph speed limit, the replies were split almost exactly 50/50. On the question of whether speeding on the A350 was a problem, 61% thought it was and 39% thought not.

As a result, the Parish Council will not lobby Dorset Council (DC) for a 20mph limit, but will press for traffic calming measures, particularly at the War Memorial where Clayesmore students and staff cross all through the day, and by The Talbot where residents of Oakwood Drive and Talbot Court cross to the village shop, the pub, church and other amenities, again, all day, and school children cross to the bus stop. Several people high-lighted the fact that among us we have people who because of age (including young children) or infirmity, cannot rush across the road, but need to be able to take their time. They must be provided for. Traffic must be calmed!

So, what can be done? Based on your suggestions and conversations with DC Highways engineers, our principal arguments will be for SIDs (Speed Indicator Device) such as the one deployed in Fontmell Magna; for proper pedestrian crossings at the War Memorial and The Talbot, although DC engineers say that such crossings are not possible at those places. Failing that, we'll try for speed bumps and colour changes to the road surface at these places. And along the length of the A350 through the village, additional signage, in particular at the southern end where the change from 50mph to 30mph is very abrupt, resulting in vehicles, although decelerating, still going faster than 30mph when passing the first Oakwood Drive entrance road.

All this will take time, so what can we do now to calm traffic? Well, Speed Watch is effective and the Speed Watch team can always use new members. To join, contact Geoff Peters at qeoff.peters13@hotmail.co.uk . Training will be provided.

NEW FOOTPATH TO SHROTON FROM OYLES MILL

There is a new footpath at Oyles Mill running past the tennis court towards Shroton. This is a shorter route than the old path and will provide residents of the Mill with greater privacy. It also shortens the way through the water meadow which can be very wet and boggy. The new route is well sign-posted; Dorset Council are considering making this diversion permanent.

The byway, D33107, to Park Farm, will be unaffected.

BLANDFORD OPENS ITS GARDENS FOR CHARITY

Blandford's Hidden Gardens will be on display again on Sunday June 8th, when private gardens, large and small, in the Georgian town centre and outlying areas will be open to visitors in support of local and national charitable causes.

It's an opportunity to explore parts of the town you may not have seen, and in the gardens of Georgian, Victorian and more modern houses you will find ponds, wildlife planting, World War II and natural defences, sometimes ancient and awardwinning trees, artworks and ceramics, and a wide selection of shrubs, perennials, annuals and climate-resilient plants.

Proceeds from ticket sales go to local charities chosen by the organisers, the Blandford Environmental Trust, and those opening their gardens raise funds for a cause of their choice by offering refreshments or plants for sale.

Last year over £3000 was raised bringing the total raised since the event was first held in 2008 to over £30,000.

Most of the gardens will be open to the public between 11am and 5pm on the day, and tickets giving details and allowing entry to them all are on sale from the Town Museum in the Market

Place and the Blandford Information Centre in West Street.

Niels Kraunsoe has served on the PCC for over 20 years, the last nine as Church Secretary. He has now retired and his place has been taken by David Parkhouse, while David Sirl has replaced Peter Wintle as Treasurer. We are most grateful to Niels and Peter for their faithful service, and to those who have stepped forward to fill the gaps.

For the last 6 years Linda Jones, Jenny and David have been leading a more informal service (Worship for All) on the fourth Sunday of the month. They will be stepping down as Lay Worship Leaders after the service on 22nd June. David John has decided to introduce something a little more formal to Iwerne - Sung Communion – which has proved popular in Fontmell. A small choir of around a dozen has already been recruited and we will look forward to hearing them singing the Gloria and the responses, and maybe the occasional anthem? Do come and join us.
