CORONATION 1953

1953 now seems a very long time ago and I have been asked for my memory of how it was celebrated in Iwerne Minster. The memories are rather vague which shows that we certainly were not on the map of "The Biggest Celebration". On the morning of a dullish day, I think it rained in London. We all attended a church service, pleased to be free from

school. Then came the bit I remember most. We were allowed through the corner gate into the garden of the "Homestead", now "The Oakhouse". It was almost forbidden territory to us youngsters. There we each received a cup & saucer [now lost] and a copy of the New Testament [still treasured], by the chairman of the Parish Council. Standing with him would have been other councillors and Sir Cyril Norwood who lived in the "Homestead".



Of course TV was a new thing in the village, so those lucky enough to have one [not many] invited people to cram into their cottages later in the day to watch the procession and recordings of the ceremony. Such was the squash that most of us youngsters got hot and bored so decided to go off and play. We didn't perhaps realise the importance of the occasion.

A few days later we went to Clayesmore School Theatre where we watched the Pathé News film of the event which we all enjoyed much more. I don't remember any flags or bunting on the houses.

THE VIEW FROM ST MARY'S

It was entirely fitting that the service at which we remembered the life of Richard Hood took place at St Mary's, the church to which he devoted so much of his time and energy since moving with Jane to Iwerne Minster in 2011. It brought to mind the inscription on the memorial to Christopher Wren in St Paul's Cathedral – "si monumentum requiris, circumspice" (if you seek his monument, look around you). The church was packed with family and friends for a moving and uplifting service. There was standing room only as so many people came to pay their respects and to remember Richard. An unforgettable occasion.

The work on the refurbishment of St Mary's is continuing now that the Christmas break is over, and completion of the work really is in sight. The relaying of the floor in the chancel should be completed soon, followed by lighting, plumbing and heating. Then the last of the pews and the choir stalls will be re-positioned and the area decorated. The new Bishop of Salisbury, the Right Reverend Stephen Lake, has kindly offered to lead a service of celebration on Monday, 11th April.

The beginning of December saw the revival of the St Mary's Christmas Bazaar, which had to be cancelled in 2021 due to the pandemic. It was very well attended and people spent generously, particularly on the excellent raffle. The Bazaar raised an amazing £700 which was given to Alabare,(the charity for the homeless which the church has supported for many years), with an additional £300 from St Mary's to round the donation up to £1000. Huge thanks are due to Sue Le Prevost for organising the Bazaar and to all those who contributed to a very successful event.

It was wonderful to enjoy the Christmas services in the newly decorated nave and in warmth and comfort! We held a traditional crib and carol service on the Sunday before Christmas. The midnight communion service on Christmas Eve is always popular, and a well-attended Christmas Day service was led by Bishop Tim Thornton, who revealed a great store of "knock knock" jokes during his sermon.

The church looked glorious during the Christmas period. The features were the traditional crib which has graced the church for so many years, the beautifully decorated Christmas tree kindly donated by Clayesmore School, and the flowers which I think were as lovely as I have ever seen them.

The period between Christmas and Lent is traditionally relatively quiet, but Home Groups continue and Carolyn Jervis and Jenny Parkhouse are launching another Bible Course focusing on the Gospel of John, starting on 31st January. ELECTRICITY SUPPLY TO IWERNE MINSTER

Whoever is billing you for electricity, the actual physical supply is provided by the Scottish and Southern Electricity Network (SSEN). SSE is the organisation you should contact in the event of a power cut.

IM is supplied from the high voltage distribution station at Park Farm. Supply comes into the village past Oyles Mill and then splits around the village, creating something like a ring main or a net. This means that the village itself has a pretty robust supply. Thus, if a section goes down, it is possible, via the substations in the village, to reconnect the section. Outlying sites, like Hill Farm, Peggs Farm, Farringdon, West Lodge, are on spurs and consequently more vulnerable.

How do we use electrical power? All households use electricity for lighting. Many use it for cooking. All those with oil or gas central heating boilers will use it to run the timers, to fire up the boiler and to drive the central heating circulation pumps. For some the LX supply is critical, those needing dialysis machines, for example. Households which are classed as vulnerable, such as those with very young children, the old, the infirm and those with certain health conditions, should ensure they are on the SSE list of vulnerable households,

so they can be prioritized and additional provision made in the event of an outage. This applies whether the outage is scheduled or unscheduled. **See box** for info about getting on the register.

In the event of a severe, long term outage, SSE can provide generators. SSE can also deploy a 'meals van' providing basic hot food and drink. In an extreme outage event, they would be sited somewhere near a communal hall that that can be lit and heated, for example Abingdon Hall, the village Club House or the church (when the present work is completed).

Vulnerable peoples' register

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Vulnerability includes: disability, children under five, blindness, deafness, chronic illness, aged over 60, those using medical equipment or aids reliant on electricity. This is not a definitive list, so contact SSE and discuss your situation.

If you have vulnerable people in your house, let SSE know.

You can do this either by 'phoning them on **0800 294 3259**

Or visiting their website: <u>Priority Services Register - SSE</u>

Or completing their form (available from the village shop)

What simple pre-emptive preparation can we as individuals make now?

Well, quite a bit, in fact:-			
Torch:	The simplest preparation is to have a torch <i>easily</i> to		
	hand, i.e. not buried at the back of a drawer (which drawe		
	was it?) and a set of fresh batteries.		
Warm clothes & blankets:	Keep them easily accessible.		
Cordless devices:	Keep your mobile 'phones, iPad, etc charged. Similarly		
	for stair lifts and any medical equipment.		
Camping gas cooker:	If you have one, keep it handy with spare gas cylinders.		
Electric car:	Keep charged.		
Vulnerable household:	Make sure you are registered with SSE.		

And what can we do in the longer term is: - Use less electricity! All sorts of things can reduce your usage and your bill. Change to LED lights; when you replace any white goods, favour low energy models with the green A, A+ or A++ rating; cold wash laundry (and do it less often!) and switch off appliances at night.
