## JUNE 2024 - IWERNE MINSTER CRICKET CLUB – UPDATE



The first opportunity to see cricket return to the village will have (all being well with the weather) taken place on Sunday June 2<sup>nd</sup>, with two further fixtures arranged for the evenings of the June 10<sup>th</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> July 3<sup>rd</sup>. The evening games are set to start at 6pm, based broadly on 20/20 rules. Volunteer umpires welcome!

Central to all of this is the need to continue with the work to prepare the ground, both the outfield and square itself. With support from the Iwerne Estate including the discovery of the previously owned cricket club lawnmower, used to maintain the square, and made available to the IMCC, there is a need for kit such as the basic pitch marking frames, completion of the work required to get both practice nets up and working and, at some stage, site screens. A heavy roller would also be welcome and to support the need for this equipment any donations would be welcomed.

Membership fees have been set at £35 for adults aged 16 and over and free for juniors, those aged up to the  $16^{th}$  birthday. Match fees are set at £5 per game.

Application forms will be available for anyone interested in either playing for or joining the club as a non-playing member. Spectators will of course be welcome at any games.

Repeating the message from the previous newsletter, any potential players or supporters who first expressed an interest in the autumn of 2023 and again this year, are invited to contact me on the email address below, if you have not already done so. That said it is our intention to set up a better platform such as WhatsApp, which is currently used by the IMCC committee. It would also be hoped that an IMCC website could be developed in the near future.

At this stage and repeating the message again our numbers remain the driving force, so if you are interested in playing village cricket for IMCC, please let us know, including your contact details if not already provided.

## GOOD NEWS FOR IWERNE MINSTER FROM WESSEX INTERNET

Some of you may be aware that Wessex Internet is bringing full fibre broadband to our village this autumn. In a nutshell, this means that over 200 properties could be connected to the fastest, most reliable broadband, which means a much improved internet connection. For many of us, it will put an end to buffering, poor reception and sluggish speeds – whether working from home, booking medical appointments, shopping online or browsing the internet.

It is early days, but Cllr Paul Le Prevost and Cllr Susan Trim met with a Wessex Internet Community Engagement Manager to find out a bit more about their plans, timings and how they will communicate with everyone on progress. During June, their external team will be out and about as they determine the proposed route of the main network. This will involve talking to some residents and landowners. Constructing the network will start in August, and this will be complete by September. After this, they will be ready to bring the full fibre connection direct to individual properties.

There is no need to worry if you are unsure of what this means for you – Wessex Internet will start engaging with everyone in the next couple of months.

Look for updates and details of Public Meetings, which all village residents will be invited to, on the Iwerne Minster WhatsApp Community, The Village Diary, The Village Newsletter, The Next Door Community Forum and Village Noticeboards. Wessex will also be visiting door to door. # TAKE THE BUS TO SALISBURY

The PlusBus is a fortnightly bus service, operated by Dorset Community Transport, which runs from bus stops in Iwerne Minster to the centre of Salisbury (outside the Odeon) and back. On alternate Tuesdays the 16-seater bus offers free travel to those over 60 who have a bus pass. (Without a bus pass the fare is £8.00 return.) You save on petrol and parking fees.

Leaving Iwerne at 9.30 am and returning from Salisbury at 12.30 pm on Tuesdays, the fast service is great for a 2-hour visit to Salisbury – enough time to do some shopping, meet up with a friend for coffee, or revisit the cathedral or museum.

To use this service, a passenger must register to become a member by completing an application form available from Vanessa on 01258 287987. Once membership is confirmed, a seat must be reserved in advance. (Note: this is NOT a normal request or 'hop on' service.) The Plus Bus will run on June 4<sup>th</sup>, June 18<sup>th</sup>, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, July 16<sup>th</sup> and July 30<sup>th</sup>.

## THE VIEW FROM ST MARY'S

Since the last newsletter we have had a busy time at St Mary's. A large congregation celebrated Easter and the resurrection. The church was beautifully decorated with Easter lilies. Jenny Parkhouse has written about the significance of lilies at Easter in Valley Views.

A few teething troubles following the refurbishment have now been sorted out and the church is being used for far more than the regular Sunday services. The first service of Choral Evensong to be held at St Mary's for some years took place in April. It was very well attended and the large congregation enjoyed the fine language and some splendid singing by the seven strong choir. There are more such services planned for July, September and November (All Saints Day).

St Mary's was the venue for the presentation to the community of the Iwerne Minster Emergency Plan. It was very well attended (the church was full) and it was reassuring to learn what measures are in place should they be needed.

The church will shortly be holding a film night as part of the Diocesan "Making Jesus Known" initiative. The film, The Most Reluctant Convert tells the story of C.S.Lewis's conversion from implacable atheism to firm faith and one of the greatest Christian writers of the twentieth century. (Lewis is played by Nicholas Ralph, James Herriott from All Creatures Great and Small).

On July 29<sup>th</sup> St Mary's is hosting a Women's Breakfast Buffet. The buffet will be followed by a Bible based talk and discussion led by Carolyn Jervis, looking at how we can be sure that we are loved, redeemed and secured. Anyone interested in attending what promises to be a special event please contact Carolyn or Jenny Parkhouse.

Consideration is also being given to hosting a regular coffee morning in the church. Questionnaires will be sent out to see if there is an appetite for this. It will, I am sure, involve cake!

As well as the church itself, the North Chapel, now known as the Church Meeting Room is also available for use by the community. It is ideal for meetings of around a dozen people. The group that has been meeting for Bible study for the past three years now meets there on a Tuesday afternoon. A new series has just started looking at the book of Acts, and the founding of the early church after the resurrection and ascension of Jesus. Please contact Carolyn or Jenny for more information.

And finally we welcome a new addition to the clergy team. David Sinclair will be ordained on June 30<sup>th</sup> at Salisbury Cathedral and will join the Benefice as a curate on July 14<sup>th</sup>. David worked for 30 years as an accountant and financial planner before training as a counsellor. He has undertaken numerous different roles in the church. We are looking forward to welcoming him to the Benefice.

## **MAY WALK 2024**



May's walk of the Iwerne Valley Walking Group saw us tramping the boundary of Rushmore Golf Club. Dodging golf balls, earnest golfers and the potential of thunder, the walk took us through two counties – Wiltshire and Dorset – and we made it back to the clubhouse in fine form.

Although the bluebells were no longer in view (*apparently they are lovely around the golf club*) the garlic was still out in force and the pungent smell of said bulb accompanied us for most of the walk.

The group traversed gentle hills, hidden valleys, woods and the edge of the golf course, often accompanied by the calling of lambs who were a little nervous of eleven walkers and three (on-lead) dogs walking through their midst. We were very lucky with the weather, and it really did feel like early summer with everything so green.

The walk ended at the Club House where the overall verdict of the welcome and food was "fantastic".

## TALK IN APRIL: ABINGDON HALL TAPESTRY

This was a very special talk given by Maggie Hale who has lived here for fifteen years. Maggie described the ambitious project which she and other villagers are currently creating for the arched window in the Abingdon Hall. The idea came originally from images on a map of the village which the late David Hicks, a talented artist, created for the wedding of Maggie's daughter. These images were later transferred onto tea towels and finally Maggie had the idea of creating a set of complex tapestries for Abingdon Hall.

Sally Green, sadly no longer with us, helped with the maths, and Judith Dutch spent six months creating eleven watercolours of the original images and then very skilfully transferred them onto canvas. The images reflect the passing seasons and form a continuous landscape highlighting various iconic village buildings and views.

With the help of the late Sheelagh Duly's legacy to the Abingdon Hall, Maggie and Judith went shopping in Herrings in Dorchester and bought many skeins of wool in a rainbow of colours. These wools were then meticulously sorted and labelled by Trish Neal. Keith Richards in the D.T. department at Clayesmore School has been very helpful too, using a specialist computer programme to ensure that the measurements of the individual tapestries were accurate; the ovoid arch makes this a tricky business! Then came the delicate task of choosing which embroidery stitches to use to both cover the canvases and to convey the beauty of Judith's artwork.

Villagers were invited to join Maggie and her team and after a lot of practising of stitches, they set to work. A dedicated group of embroiderers now meet in the Abingdon Hall on Wednesday mornings, enjoying not only the satisfaction of seeing their dedication creating a new work of art but also the pleasure of each other's company.

We look forward to witnessing the final product when it is in situ and are certainly fortunate in having so many people who are willing to create such a thing of beauty for us to admire. **MG** 

## TALK IN MAY: BUILDING AN ECO HOUSE

A select group met in Sutton Waldron to listen to an excellent talk by Anthony Lamb about the house he and his partner, Andy Andrews, have built from scratch near Wells in Somerset. With the help of photographs taken to document each stage of a very arduous process, Anthony demonstrated how his eco-friendly house took shape beginning with the purchase of a condemned cottage built on clay. They built a very sturdy foundation on concrete piles and then erected a timber frame of Douglas fir. They built the walls of straw bales having attended a course which taught them how to create different sized blocks of the straw using bale needles and bale twine, finished off with a hedge trimmer to slice and smooth the bales so they fitted into different spaces. The straw was rendered with lime and will be regularly limewashed. The roof, which had been put up earlier using tiles recovered from the old cottage, has modern solar and thermal panels to ensure they have hot water and electricity supplies. Inside it is beautifully fitted out with wood everywhere. The building has many eco features, like a heat recovery ventilation system and a green sedum roof, so it never gets cold. To top it all, Andy has created a lovely garden and they look over the vale towards Glastonbury Tor. The building took a year and they were helped by many friends and some skilled professionals but above all it took determination on the part of Anthony and Andy to see their project to completion. ## DUCKLINGS RESCUED IN IWERNE MINSTER

Sophie (from Stubhampton) and her daughter were driving on Tower Hill on Saturday 27 April, when they heard a great commotion: a mother duck had lost two ducklings through the grating of an old road drain. Sophie called Tim Ingram of Home Farm House to help. Unable to open the grating and free the ducklings (the grating was firmly rusted into its surrounds), Tim went off for help.

Soon Sue Le Prevost, Dianne Benfield and Anne and Richard Thomas came to assist. Despite Sue's crowbar they were still unable to get access to the drain. Then the three ladies had a brilliant idea: get a small fishing net. This fitted through the grating but the ducklings weren't keen on being caught; in fact one of them disappeared along the overflow pipe! Luckily this little duckling reappeared, and then with assistance from all, the two ducklings were successfully netted up through the grill one-byone and happily reunited with their mother.
